Timeline


November 2, 1935: Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir arrive in Canada August 6, 1936: Tweedsmuirs embark on a tour of Western Canada September 14, 1936: Lady Tweedsmuir requests grant from the Carnegie Corporation (unsuccessful)

November 29, 1937: Lady Tweedsmuir receives grant from the Carnegie Corporation

September 10, 1939: Canada declares war on Germany

February 1, 1940: Scheme receives second grant from the Carnegie Corporation

February 11, 1940: Lord Tweedsmuir dies in Montreal March 17, 1940: Lady Tweedsmuir leaves Canada; *The Times* (London) records that the Prairie Library Scheme distributed 40,000 books
