"We do everything"


- Multiple occupational roles

- Is our professional identity shaped by the functions we carry out?
- Or is it shaped by:
 - LIS programs, professional associations, institutional imperatives, personal values?

Librarian professional identity in the LIS literature

- Librarian identity
 - Walter (2008): Identities as teachers
 - Watson-Boone (1998): Expressions of self
 - Carson (2002): Labour processes
- Identity in other professions
 - Teachers, managers, academics
- Social psychology
 - Identity theory, identity conflict, work-gender identity, identity and workplace, etc.

Concept mapping

- Relevance of literature to experience in academic libraries
- Also helped:
 - Generate new ideas
 - Draw connections
 - Get a 'big picture' overview
 - Feel confident in the project



Research questions

- How do librarians conceive of professional identity with respect to roles, requirements and psychological processes?
- 2. How and why do professional identities develop? What causes them to change?
- 3. What is the impact of librarian professional identity on perceptions of the academic library and on professional practice?

Methodology

- Based on James Marcia's "Ego Identity Incomplete Sentences Blank"
- Questionnaire (sentence completion)
- Quantitative survey method
- Allows large participant pool
- Less subjective interpretation

Looking ahead

- Next step questionnaire

 - Ethics
 - Sample
 - Distribution
 - Analysis
- Written piece
